Participating growers will receive technical and financial support as well as other benefits that can enhance their operations, profitability and environmental stewardship.

Climate-Smart Vegetable Production in the Southern Piedmont

Rodale Institute, in partnership with a team of twelve universities, farming NGOs, and consulting firms, is working with vegetable farmers and farmers markets in the Southern Piedmont to promote the adoption of climate-smart farming practices and expand markets for the sale of climate-smart commodities.

Fruit and Vegetable Safety Training Video for Field Employees

Safely producing fruits and vegetables requires everyone involved in planting, growing, harvesting, packing, and transporting fresh produce to understand food safety practices, as well as commitment from company owners and managers. This video was developed to support fresh produce growers as they implement employee training to reduce risks during fruit and vegetable production. It is intended for all farm employees, but especially focused on those employees that work in the field harvesting and packing fresh produce. Employee training is not only important for ensuring the microbial safety of fresh produce, but for meeting buyer food safety requirements, third-party audit requirements, and for being compliant with the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule. One of the requirements of the Produce Safety Rule is that those working with fresh produce must receive annual training on food safety practices, so this video was created just for them! <u>Also available in Spanish.</u>

The Woods in Your Backyard online course

September 5 - November 14, 2023. Online. \$95 The course will help landowners convert lawn to natural areas and enhance stewardship of existing natural areas. Based on the guide of the same name, the course provides strategies to landowners of small parcels of land (1-10 acres) that improve the stewardship of their property for personal enjoyment and environmental quality. It uses a hands-on learning approach to help participants develop and implement a plan for their property. Activities include how to map habitat areas, understand basic ecological principles about woodland and wildlife, choose and implement a few habitat management projects, and how to set a timetable and record your progress. Online discussion groups will allow participants to interact with others taking the course. A certificate of completion is awarded when all assignments are completed.

Mapping with Drones (Virtual, 4 dates)

This 2-day virtual workshop will prepare participants with the knowledge necessary to take the FAA Remote Knowledge Aircraft Test (aka Part 107). All workshop materials are provided to participants (via snail-mail) prior to the workshop. The workshop has been well received by educators (high school, 2-year, 4-year), state & federal agency employees, the private sector (ranging from engineers to realtors), Cooperative Extension, and a slew of folks from various NGO's. This workshop is a great place to start for individuals who are considering using drones to support business applications, or managers who want to make solid decisions regarding drone issues moving forward.

Soil Health Training Summer Webinars

The Virginia Soil Health Coalition is hosting a series of webinars with soil health specialist Mark Schonbeck. The webinars are part of a professional development program grant with Southern Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE). Mark has worked for 31 years as a researcher, consultant, and educator in sustainable and organic agriculture. He has participated in on-farm research into mulching, cover crops, minimum tillage, and nutrient management for organic vegetables. For many years, he has written for the Virginia Association for Biological Farming newsletter and served as their policy liaison to the National Sustainable Agriculture Coalition. He has also participated in different research projects to analyze, evaluate and improve federally funded organic and sustainable agriculture programs. In addition, Mark offers individual consulting in soil test interpretation, soil quality and nutrient management, crop rotation, cover cropping, and weed management.

August 8, 2:00-3:00 pm: Why "Organic" Matters for Soil Health in Virginia

Throughout the history of the organic agriculture movement, soil organic matter (SOM) has played a central role in the goals and practices of the organic method. The NOP Standards codify this priority, requiring certified producers to implement systems and practices that build SOM and soil health. This webinar will explore the nature of soil organic matter and how it relates to soil health, review recent research that documents the efficacy of organic systems in building and maintaining SOM, and provide guidelines for organic farmers and conservationists on how to fully realize the potential of the organic method to optimize SOM and soil health.

August 17, 2:00-3:00 pm: Biological Nutrient Management for Virginia

Organic and natural mineral nutrient sources allowed by the USDA NOP Standards offer both advantages and challenges in meeting crop needs while enhancing soil health and protecting ground and surface water from excess nutrients. Unlike conventional soluble fertilizers that can be metered precisely, organic nutrient sources must undergo biological processing to release nutrients, especially nitrogen (N) and phosphorus (P) to crops. As best organic practices enhance soil health, the soil's biological capacity to meet crop nutrient without concentrated fertilizers increases. This webinar will explore biologically based nutrient dynamics and provide guidance on how organic producers and conservationists can realize the soil's potential to sustain production with minimal use of concentrated and potentially polluting nutrient sources.

Podcast Episode 23-16: Seeds of Change: Enhancing Food Access, Local Food Systems, and Childhood Education

Healthy soil means healthy plants which means healthy people and a healthy planet. In this episode, Jeff Ishee, Eric Bendfeldt, and Sarah Koth speak with Kathy Yoder, the Education Outreach Program Director

at Vine and Fig in Harrisonburg, Virginia, about the nonprofit's local programs to strengthen local food systems, ensure access to wholesome nutrition for underserved communities, and educate youth on food production and sustainability. Kathy digs into the importance of empowering young minds to understand the connection between the life in the soil and a sustainable environment, specifically as relates to compost production and use. Listen to learn how Vine & Fig and the New Community Project are sowing the seeds of positive change to cultivate a healthier, more sustainable future for all from the soil up.

The Spotted Lanternfly is an invasive species native to Asia. In 2014 it was found in Pennsylvania, and has since spread to multiple counties in Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Virginia. This insect is a threat to many fruit crops and trees. The Asian Longhorn Tick is native to eastern Asia. It is a serious pest of livestock as well as pets. Cattle producers and homeowners should be aware of it. This important information will be presented by Scott Baker, ANR Agent in Bedford County.

Beginning, socially disadvantaged, and veteran farmers can get help to prepare applications for farm ownership and operating loans and learn about the requirements for borrowing. Find out about the resources and current grants that are available from USDA, including the Rural Development Renewable Energy for America (REAP) grant and loan guarantee program, Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) program, and Rural Business Enterprise Grant (RBEG) program. USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) programs are also available. These programs can help you implement conservation practices to reduce soil erosion, enhance water supplies, improve water quality, increase wildlife habitat and reduce damages caused by floods and other natural disasters.

We'll plant grape vines at the first Black woman owned winery in Virginia while learning about conservation opportunities in agriculture for heir property. We will also discuss generational wealth and asset management while enjoying African cuisine.

August 29, 10:00 – 12:00 pm: Dexter 101 (Rapidan, VA)

This workshop will introduce participants to Dexter cattle and provide guidance and decision-making tools for small beef producers who are considering herds that include Dexter genetics. The information presented is based on current research being conducted at Virginia State University to access the appropriateness of Dexter and Dexter x Mashona crosses for small beef producers in Virginia. Dexter cattle are a small frame dual-purpose breed with the potential for meat to be more marbled than that of commercial breeds. Mashona cattle are hardy and known for their resistance to high temperatures, ticks and flies; and their ability to maintain reproductive efficiency in semi-arid regions.

August 31, 7:00-8:00 pm: Extending the Sheep & Goat Grazing Season Virtual Pasture Walk (Virtual)

An important goal for most livestock producers is to extend the grazing season, filling gaps in the availability of pasture forage. During this virtual pasture walk, we will look at ways to improve your pastures, increase carrying capacity and lengthen your grazing season. Learn how to improve pasture quality, increase production, and lower grazing expenses for sheep and goats.

September Events

September 7, 9 am – 12:00 pm: Sustainable Forestry & Small Wood Lot Management (Halifax, VA)

Sustainable forestry management is complex, with the need to manage trees, wildlife and the environment. We will discuss topics such as determining your management goals; working with forest professionals; timber sales and harvest; water quality; forest health; wildlife and other unexpected factors. We will also provide information on USDA programs and services relating to forestry management, tree planting and financial assistance. At the end of the workshop we will visit two forestry sites.

September 8-9: Advanced Woodland Owner Retreat (Providence Forage, VA)

Developed for those new to actively managing their woods, the Retreats combine classroom, field trip, and hands-on activities to teach concepts of sustainable woodland management. Past participation in landowner education programs is required.

September 9, 8:45-12:30 pm: New Christmas Tree Growers Meeting (Winchester, VA)

Kyle Peer, Superintendent - Reynolds Homestead Forest Resources Research Center, and Ryan Clouse, grower of Clouse's Pine Hill Farm, will discuss getting started with Christmas tree production. The topics include seedling selection, planting techniques, farm layout, and shearing. We will also discuss applying pesticides and herbicides safely. This is a hands-on workshop with indoor and outdoor sessions, wear appropriate footwear and bring work gloves. Please pre-register by September 4th.

September 9, 10:00-12:00 pm: Small Engine Maintenance (Ettrick, VA)

Come to this workshop and learn how to save time and money with best practices to maintain small engine farm equipment and keep it running year after year. October 3, 10:00-12:00 pm: Introduction to Permaculture (Petersburg, VA)

Permaculture is more than a new system of recordkeeping and urban agriculture. It is an ecological design system based on systems found in nature. Patrick Johnson, of Nanih Farm and Garden, Inc., will lead this workshop. Come learn about the key concepts surrounding the broader aspects of permaculture: care for people, care for the earth, and fair share.

October 4, 1:00-3:300 pm: Farm Pond Management (Burkeville, VA)

Mackenzie Gunn, Virginia Cooperative Extension agent for Amelia County, holds BS degrees in marine studies and agriculture, and a masters degree in wildlife, fisheries and aquaculture. October 11, 2:00-4:00 pm: Bringing Basic Solar Energy to Your Farm (Fredericksburg, VA)

Solar energy can provide farmers with invaluable power options on the farm. It is convenient and inexpensive. Join Farmer Thomas Roberson as he discusses solar energy options in use on his small 10-acre farm. Learn about design basics, solar operations, and how he uses it for electric fencing, powering his well and cooling his high tunnels during the summer.

October 17, 9:00-11:00 am: Small Farm Orientation (Virtual)

This two-hour Zoom course is for new farmers with zero to five years of experience operating a farm. Derrick Cladd, state program assistant for the VSU Small Farm Outreach Program, will walk attendees through the process of how to develop a productive and profitable farm. Participants will receive a Small Farm Orientation manual.

October 18, 4:30-6:00 pm: Small Fruit Production (Mechanicsville, VA)

Mr. Jim Stewart, a producer with years of experience, will lead this workshop on small fruit production and maintenance. Attendees will learn methods of producing small fruit crops such as blackberries, raspberries and strawberries. There will be a discussion of planting methods and cultivation practices. We will also discuss soil fertility requirements and the best soils for different berry types.

October 18, 6:00-8:00 pm: Diversifying Streams of Revenue on Your Farm (Virtual)

As farming expands from cows, plows and sows, listen to Michael Carter Jr. of Carter Farms and Africulture as he talks about how to increase revenue through unconventional farm products and the use of soft skills. Winter months should not mean a decline in revenue. Let's explore ways to put your farm experiences to work for more profitable enterprises.

October 18-20: Lancaster PA Cattleman's Bus Tour (Lancaster, PA)

The CCCA Bus Trip to Lancaster County, PA is now accepting reservations. The trip will depart Rustburg Wednesday, October 18, at 7:30 am and return on the evening of Friday, October 20. Non-members can register after May 1 @ a slightly higher rate. We will be staying at the Comfort Inn in Denver, PA for 2 nights. On our way north on Wednesday, we will stop at a Graze 300 Demonstration Site in the Shenandoah Valley. Upon arrival in Lancaster County, we will make a farm visit prior to supper. Thursday will be devoted to farm visits around Lancaster County. On Friday morning, we will visit the Green Dragon Farmers' Market before departing for home. En route, we will visit Roseda Farm at Monkton, MD where we will be treated to lunch and a farm tour.

October 20, 1:00-3:00 pm: Converting Cropland to Pasture for Sheep (Kilmarnock, VA)

Point Pleasant Farm is a new/old farm located in the Coastal Plain of Virginia. The land has been cleared and farmed for over 100 years. It was mostly crop-farmed until 2020 when Nan Harvey purchased several small adjoining parcels, added fencing and changed the land use to livestock farming. Nan will share the good, bad and ugly she had to face along the way. Raising sheep changed the crop from a bean/wheat/corn rotation cycle to a permanent grassland constrained by proximity to the Chesapeake Bay. With invaluable technical support from the Virginia State University Small Farm Outreach Program, VT Small Farms Nutrient Management Program and extensive research, the livestock operation is working towards sustainability. Elaine Shirley, President of the Leicester Longwool Sheep Breeders Association, will also join us to address the special challenges and rewards of raising heritage breed sheep.

October 21, 11:30-1:30 pm: Lambing and Kidding Skills for Success (Abingdon, VA)

Beginning and experienced sheep and goat producers will visit Beyond Blessed Farm to learn about best management practices before and after lambing or kidding. This workshop includes preventing lamb or kid loss, the importance of colostrum, strategies for troubleshooting when birthing complications occur and diagnosing and treating newborn lamb or kid problems. Dr. Chris Fletcher and Dr. Emily Hoss will provide instruction and demonstration. A lamb dinner will be provided.

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
