The Virginia Black Farmer Directory by Briana Stevenson

This is a timely news item on a project spearheaded by the Local Food Hub's Grower Outreach and Diversity Coordinator Briana Stevenson aimed at centering Black farmers, their stories, and their businesses. The directory serves as a central location that connects Black farmers in Virginia with consumers as well as Black farmers to a variety of resources. Responding to the need for farmer visibility and the disconnect between Black farmers and consumers, the directory spotlights prominent farmers and their businesses. According to the article, the project was a collective effort initiated by the food justice interns at Cultivate Charlottesville and Michael Carter Jr. of Africulture and Carter Farms. To the initiators, this comes at a time when there is a call to give a voice to those who have been systemically oppressed in their relationship with food and land.

Fresh Produce Grower Cost-Share Opportunity

If you are a fresh produce grower looking to upgrade, improve, or invest in infrastructure for your business operations to meet Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) food safety standards and certifications, you may be eligible for a 33% reimbursement on your purchases up to \$5,000. In support current and new commercial produce growers in Southwest Virginia, the FRESH START: On-Farm Produce Safety Investments from Farm to Market is offered by the Virginia Cooperative Extension and the Virginia Pumpkin Growers Association, and sponsored by the Tobacco Region Revitalization Commission. This project helps produce growers examine ways of improving or investing in infrastructure for best food safety practices, builds understanding of the importance of GAP certification, and introduces fundamentals of value-added processing and methods. April 6: Managing and Selling Your Timber (Rapidan, VA)

We'll look at current trends and issues that impact your forest ownership interests, such as markets, timber sales, harvesting dynamics, and other unique opportunities. Neil Clark, a Forestry Educator with the Virginia Cooperative Extension, will lead the workshop.

Non-timber forest products (NTFPs) are the backbone of forest farming. Understanding, stewarding and managing expectations around these unique species are key to a deeper understanding of forest farming practices. In this webinar, Jeanine, Margaret, and Joe will talk about growing woodland botanicals other than ginseng. They will put an emphasis on selling and marketing these plants and discuss several types of operations and realistic financial expectations.

April 18: Fundamentals of Marketing (Buena Vista, VA)

Using his lifetime of direct marketing experience, Joel Salatin will present the foundations for developing a marketing strategy. These include product selection, branding, messaging, and the ultimate transaction interface. Perhaps the hardest thing in farmer direct marketing is to think like a customer. The most rewarding thing is developing loyal customers. In this fast-paced presentation, he will explain what he's learned and confess to what he doesn't yet know.

April 19: Embracing Spring Cooking and Zero Waste

Join the Alleghany Mountain Institute as they cook a Spring Minestrone Soup with herb pesto and homemade bread that is delicious, zero waste, and embraces spring! In this workshop, participants will learn tips on how to reduce food waste, while making a delicious seasonal meal. It will cover: making pesto, creative ways to freeze greens, infusing sauces and vinegars, and creating a perfect veggie stock. There truly isn't a better time to cook and reduce our waste than in the spring! This class is the first in their three-part series focused on Food Waste and Sustainability at the Allegheny Mountain Institute Farm at Augusta Health in Augusta County Virginia.

April 19: How to Make Goat's Milk Soap (Toano, VA)

Maureen Anderson, of The Home Farm in Toano, Virginia, will lead this presentation. She makes 'Tasha's Own Goat's Milk Soap," using Nubian goat's milk and farm-grown herbs and honey from her beehives. She will provide an in-person demonstration on how she makes her soap. She will also advise on marketing strategies for homemade soap.

April 19: USDA Informational Session

Learn about eligibility requirements and how to apply for USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) direct or guaranteed loans as well as programs, service and cost share opportunities from other USDA agencies. Beginning, socially disadvantaged, and veteran farmers can get help to prepare applications for farm ownership and operating loans and learn about the requirements for borrowing.

April 19-20: Produce Safety Alliance Grower Training Workshop

This course if offered to help produce growers learn about the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) and help them fulfill the educational requirement associated with the Produce Safety Rule. All nonexempt farms are required to have at least one person on the farm who has attended an approved FSMA PSR training, like this one. Even if you are exempt, you are required to keep specific records, which we will cover in the workshop. There will be time for discussion, so participants should come prepared to share their experiences and questions. From beginners to experienced growers, everyone can benefit from taking the time to think about food safety on their farm! The course will include remote delivery over two days. Each day, trainers will spend approximately four hours of instruction time covering content contained in seven modules.

April 20: Greater Piedmont Farmland Marketing Conference (Standardsville, VA)

This conference is an opportunity for area real estate agents and appraisers to learn about marketing tools to improve the sale of farmland. The purpose of the conference is to provide realtors with the background knowledge in agriculture, conservation and open space preservation to advise new landowner to the appropriate resources to help them make land management decision. In addition, the

program will provide hands-on computer applications for GIS and soil mapping. Our lunch speaker for the day will discuss low impact development and the economic and environmental value of this development technique. \$25 per person.

April 20: The Social Science of Agroecology: Policy and Praxis Implications

Agroecology is a systems-based agenda for food system transformation towards human and planetary health. Agroecology combines agricultural and social sciences with participatory practices, including the co-production of knowledge between scientists and farmers. However, research indicates the social science of agroecology may be less commonly employed among agricultural scientists, which diminishes its possibilities for effecting social change. To address this gap, Dr. Kelinsky-Jones will discuss the social science of agroecology by focusing on both policy for agroecology and agroecology for policy. For the former, Dr. Kelinsky-Jones will briefly discuss her research on how the United States Agency for International Development's (USAID) policy influences agroecological possibilities at sampled land-grant universities. To attend to agroecology for policy, she will provide a short overview of a science policy outreach project where her team employed an agroecological lens to develop policy possibilities for climate-resilience in Southwest Virginia. The aim of this presentation is to generate an open dialogue with participants on their questions, perceptions, and use of agroecology through a social science lens, including its possibilities for policy and community development practice. April 22: 2022 Annual Blueberry Field Walk (Petersburg, VA)

Blueberry is the fastest-growing berry crop in many states including North Carolina, Georgia, and Florida. Market demand for blueberry continues to grow, and profit potential for growing locally grown blueberry is considerable. One major issue for blueberry growers is the planting of the new blueberry cultivars (varieties) that are becoming available with superior fruit size, taste, color, and pest, and disease tolerance. In this event, the participants will learn about the characteristics of the blueberry varieties grown at Randolph Farm. Also, the production potential of container-grown blueberry will be discussed. Currently, there are 43 different blueberry varieties planted at Randolph Farm. These varieties are from three different blueberry types, Rabbiteye, Southern Highbush, and Northern Highbush. This field walk is free and open to the public.

April 27: Intro to Infusions & Tincturing with Farmed & Foraged Ingredients

Join Alleghany Mountain Institute to explore the art of infusing alcohols, tinctures, vinegars, and simple syrups with herbal aromatics and other delicious ingredients. From the history of this process in Appalachia to the chemistry occurring behind the scenes, to the culinary and mixology applications of infusions - they will discuss several different infusing methods to capture the delicious flavors of nature - many of which can be found in your own backyard!

April 27: Hive Inspection and Expansion (Petersburg, VA)

State Apiarist, Keith Tignor, will present an in-person lecture at the VSU Randolph Farm Pavilion large classroom, followed by a hands-on demonstration at the VSU Randolph Farm Bee Yard. He will demonstrate how to open a hive for inspection, how to expand hives before they swarm, and methods for collecting swarms to start a new hive. Topics will also include bee ecology, hive components and construction, beekeeping equipment, bee nucs, bee packages, feeding and caring for bees, integrated pest management, and colony collapse disorder. This workshop is intended for people with no experience up to 5 years of experience. To attend the Bee Yard demonstration, you must provide your own bee suit, wear light colors and closed-toe footwear, and make sure not to wear any cologne or perfume.

April 28: Small Ruminant Production: Hands On Fecal Egg Count (Glade Spring, VA)

The time of year for parasite burden is unfortunately upon us, so why not be proactive in developing a parasite management plan for your farm! This session will help sheep and goat producers realize the importance of avoiding blindly and routinely treating for parasite infection. Instead, farmers will learn to consider the true needs of their flocks/herds and then develop an appropriate plan. Attendees will gain a hands-on opportunity to understand the importance and implementation of fecal egg counting using the McMaster Egg Counting procedure. All necessary workshop supplies will be provided, but BYOF (bring your own fecals).

April 30: Farming with Two-Wheel Tractors (Carver Center in Culpeper, VA)

Are you a beginning farmer, urban farmer with compact space, or rural landowner looking for a tractor solution to fit your specific needs and budget? Join the Small Farm Outreach Program for a workshop demonstrating how two-wheel walking tractors can be the perfect solution for starting your farm or increasing productivity in your garden. May 3: Forest Farming Calculator Webinar

station (worm farm). Program sponsors will supply each participant with instruction and helpful tips to get started. Attendees will also receive an initial supply of composting worms, coir and newspaper bedding, and a transportable container to create their own vermicomposting station to take home so that they can incorporate this valuable composting technique in their vegetable/flower production garden/farm and prevent the often-needless added expense of relying on store-bought amendments. Clif Slade, owner of Slade Family Farm in Surry, Virginia, is a retired Extension Agent and VSU SFOP Agent. Clif will demonstrate how to plant, grow and harvest elephant garlic scapes. Clif will also describe his garlic trials under different colored plastic mulch and offer insights on marketing scapes. In the event of rain, this event will be rescheduled for May 18, 2022, from 10:00 am to 12:00 pm.

May 12: Agricultural Marketing Bus Tour (Petersburg, VA)

New and beginning farmers, ranchers, and military veterans are invited to take a bus trip to the State Farmers Market in Raleigh, North Carolina, to learn about retail and wholesale marketing of agricultural products. Participants will have an opportunity to talk with vendors and learn techniques for selling products to the public. The farmers market is one of the nation's premier markets, with over 75 acres of indoor and outdoor specialty shops, restaurants, and a garden center that sells fruits, vegetables, meats, and gifts from across the state.

May 12: Berry and Ginger Production (Halifax, VA)

Dr. Reza Rafie, Extension Specialist and Professor of Horticulture at VSU will present this workshop. Attendees will learn about innovative methods for producing berry crops, including blueberry, blackberry, and raspberry. You will also learn about growing ginger. He will go over new varieties and comparative production data, planting methods and improved cultivation practices, and yield in field production compared to growing in a high tunnel. This workshop will highlight applied research that will benefit small farmers.

May 14: Agribusiness Production & Financial Management Program

Managing a farm is more than planting and harvesting crops or raising livestock. Farming is a business,

and like any business, its success depends on proper planning and financial management. Megan Harrison and Jordan Scott will conduct the program. They are both Virginia State University College of Agriculture alumnae with expertise in farm financing. The session will help new and established farmers and ranchers learn to develop business plans, keep efficient records and discover tips on mitigating business risks, as well as how to establish credit and borrow money. Participants will learn financial management strategies to help their businesses become more profitable and sustainable. They will also visit local farms through virtual tours and have an opportunity to talk with farmers about their business enterprises. Everyone will receive an Agribusiness Production and Financial Management Manual. At the end of the workshop, participants will know how to develop and maintain a business plan and set goals for their farm operations and enterprises.

May 18-19 2022 Virginia Forage and Grassland Council's Beginner Grazing School (Orange, VA)

This 2-day intensive course is designed with both beginning and experienced producers in mind. It will cover everything you need to know to better manage grazing on your farm including forage and plant ID, pasture assessment, fencing and water system options, matching forage quality and livestock needs, and understanding a forage budget. Most importantly it will involve many hands-on activities to reinforce the concepts covered in the classroom portion of the school.

May 20-21: National Cattleman's Beef Association Stockmanship & Stewardship Event (Blacksburg, VA)

Stockmanship & Stewardship is a unique two-day educational experience for cattle producers featuring low-stress cattle handling demonstrations, Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) educational sessions, facility design sessions and industry updates that you won't find anywhere else. May 20-21: Beginning Woodland Owner Retreat (Galax, VA)

This retreat is hosted by the Virginia Department of Forestry and Virginia Cooperative Extension. It is geared towards landowners who are new to forest management, provide information on both hardwood and pine forests, offer chances for interaction with natural resource professionals from various agencies in Virginia, as well as with other landowners, provide information on estate planning, management planning and certification, and provide hands-on experience with tree identification, forestry equipment, and more.

May 21: Small Engine Repair (Catawba, VA)

Is your lawn and garden equipment ready to spring into action? Does your grass say "grow," but your mower says "no?" Does your garden scream "till," while your tiller sits still? Come and explore how something as simple as changing spark plugs, oil, and oil/air filters can increase the performance of your equipment and make your lawn and garden work a breeze. Attendees may bring in garden equipment such as lawnmowers, weed eaters, tiller, etc., to troubleshoot problems.

May 23: Sustainable Forestry Management (Halifax, VA)

Sustainable forestry management can be a complex project, with the need to manage trees, wildlife, and the environment. In this workshop, we will discuss topics such as determining your management goals, working with forest professionals, timber sales and harvest, water quality, forest health, wildlife, and other unexpected factors. We will also provide information on USDA programs and services relating to forestry management, tree planting, and financial assistance. At the conclusion of the workshop, we will visit two forestry sites.

May 24: Boots to Roots 2: Down on the Farm (Petersburg, VA)

This workshop is an on-the-farm event for military veteran farmers, ranchers, and landowners, especially for those new and beginning veteran farmers who want to learn more about what it takes to

farm profitably and sustainably. We will tour the Randolph Farm and learn about various enterprises such as urban farming, aquaculture, small ruminants, vegetable production, berry production, high tunnel production, and more. We will also learn about the USDA and other agencies that partner with us to support farmers.

May 24: USDA Non-Insured Crop Disaster Program for Farmers (Abingdon, VA)

May 26: Mapping & Crop Spraying with Drones for Precision Agriculture (Rapidan, VA)

With increasingly more potential benefits from the use of drones in agriculture and the availability of drones designed especially for agricultural applications, small-scale farmers need this basic introduction to drones in agriculture. New applications can readily facilitate information through aerial photography and maps to help to improve yields and lower operational costs. Leonel Castillo, UAS-FAA Drone Pilot, will introduce the concept of precision agriculture, employing drone applications such as map interpretation and utilization, and showing how to detect soil conditions and plant health. Participants will also learn about drone abilities such as precision spray applications for nutrition and pest control, which can cover areas difficult to access by hand, tractor, or conventional aircraft applications which are costly and difficult to mobilize.

June 1: Forest Carbon Symposium (Staunton, VA)

Forest carbon markets are expanding rapidly in the commonwealth.
