New Publication USDA SARE Bulletin: Scaling Up Your Vegetable Farm for Wholesale Markets

For direct market farmers, expanding your operation to capture local and regional wholesale markets can represent an opportunity. But such a shift brings with it many changes to how you run your farm because the expectations that wholesale buyers have is much different than your direct market customers. Scaling Up Your Vegetable Farm for Wholesale Markets guides you through the likely changes you'll need to take into consideration when planning to branch out into wholesale markets. These include business planning, working with wholesale buyers, and areas of production that range from increasing yield and produce quality, to harvest and postharvest handling, food safety and more.

New Report Farmers' Perceptions of Information and Resources for Navigating Economic Hardship and Stress

The major goal of the project was to understand the experiences of financial and emotional distress among farm households in NC, SC, and VA. A specific goal was to identify the resources that farmers undergoing distress found useful in negotiating the stress process. Additionally, the project sought to differentiate these experiences based upon race so that culturally-relevant resources could be developed in the future.

USDA Releases 2021 Organics Data

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) released the results of the 2021 Organic Survey, which show total sales of \$11.2 billion in organic products, an increase of \$1.28 billion, or 13%, from 2019. There were 17,445 certified organic farms, a 5% increase from 2019. Read more on their website.

2022 Census for Agriculture

The 2022 Census for Agriculture will begin being mailed out on November 22. Why respond?

- Combined responses show the value and importance of U.S. agriculture.
- Census data inform decisions about policy, farm and conservation programs, infrastructure and rural development, research, education, beginning farmer programs, and more.

- Response is required by federal law. The same law requires USDA to keep all personal information confidential.
- The Census of Agriculture is your opportunity to have a voice in the future of U.S. agriculture

Clay will guide you through the process of writing a business plan and share his knowledge about how a lender uses a farm business plan.

January 25: Preparation for a Successful Growing Season (South Hill, VA)

The soil is your farm's most precious natural resource. Soil testing is the first step to unlocking your soil's

full potential. Tammy Holler, Nutrient Management Specialist with the Small Farm Outreach Program, will discuss the importance of having soil testing done to determine the necessary amendments needed for a successful growing season. She will discuss reading and understanding the test results and what steps are needed in order to improve your soil and have a productive yield.

January 30-21: Produce Safety Alliance Grower Training Course (Virtual)

The Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule is the first federally regulated standard for growing, harvesting, packing, and holding fresh produce in an effort to reduce microbial contamination and foodborne illness outbreaks. If you grow fruits or vegetables, attend a training for information about best practices, and regulatory requirements. The PSA Grower Training Course is one way to satisfy the FSMA Produce Safety Rule requirement. Cost \$25. Registration required.

February Events

February 9: Changes to Livestock Antibiotic Regulations in 2023 (Virtual)

Dr. Chris Fletcher D.V.M., a large animal veterinarian, will provide instruction for livestock producers on the following topics: 1) Brief history of antibiotic use in the U.S., including examples of antibiotic resistance, 2) Recent changes involving veterinary feed directive and using antibiotics, 3) New and upcoming changes to all livestock antibiotics in June 2023, and 4) Adopting good stewardship when using antibiotics. A question and answer session will wrap up the meeting.

February 15: DCR Information Session (Virtual)

Join us for a conversation with Darryl M. Glover, of the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR), who will explain DCR's cost-share programs. These programs are administered through local Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD). The goal is to improve water quality in our streams, rivers, and the nearby Chesapeake Bay. The cost-share programs support various practices in conservation planning to treat cropland, pastureland, hay land, and forested land. As an incentive, cost-share assistance is offered to implement Best Management Practices. Participation in the programs is voluntary, and the Conservation Districts offer their expertise at no cost. Funding is based on what each District has available and how your small-scale farm ranks compared to the other applications they receive. Funding is not guaranteed.

Pruning is often neglected either due to a lack of skill or fear that improper pruning could lead to the injury or death of a tree. Pruning reduces overall tree size, improves structural strength, increases fruit production and improves the quality of fruit.
