Episode 23-25: A Healthy, Fertile Celebration of World Soil Day 2023 Since October 2021, Jeff Ishee, Mary Sketch Bryant, and Eric Bendfeldt have had sixty conversations about the health and fertility of soil as part of the podcast. To celebrate World Soils Day 2023, we are sharing three recaps of conversations that were quite memorable with Dr. David R. Montgomery and Anne Bikle authors of What Your Food Ate and Growing a Revolution; Clare Tallamy of Virginia Tech's 2022 Soil Judging Team; and Lee Rinehart a grazing specialist with the National Center for Appropriate Technology. World Soils Day was organized to bring attention and focus on the importance of healthy soil and the sustainable management of soil resources. David Montgomery and Anne Bikle start the conversation off with a discussion about soil life and how the health of soil can ultimately affect diet and nutrition at a basic level. Clare Tallamy gives a summary of how to assess and judge soil from inside a pit, while Lee Rinehart emphasizes how critical soil health is for grazing management, water quality, and drought resilience.

December 12, 4:00-6:00 pm: USDA Information Session (Petersburg, VA)

Learn about eligibility requirements and how to apply for USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) direct or guaranteed loans as well as programs, service and cost share opportunities from other USDA agencies. Beginning, socially disadvantaged, and veteran farmers can get help to prepare applications for farm ownership and operating loans and learn about the requirements for borrowing. Find out about the resources and current grants that are available from USDA, including the Rural Development Renewable Energy for America (REAP) grant and loan guarantee program, Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) program, and Rural Business Enterprise Grant (RBEG) program. USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) programs are also available. These programs can help you implement conservation practices to reduce soil erosion, enhance water supplies, improve water quality, increase wildlife habitat and reduce damages caused by floods and other natural disasters.

The Windsor Group will be providing onsite technical assistance to help farmers, ranchers and

forest landowners with your Discrimination Financial Assistance Program (DFAP) application, which is available at <u>https://www.22007apply.gov</u>.

December 21, 9:00-3:00 pm: Growing High Value Produce (Windsor, NC)

Are you interested in growing vegetables and fruits in unconventional ways to increase your farm profitability? Come join on Thursday, December 14, 2023 at the Bertie County Extension Center in Windsor, NC. Learn about growing options to produce higher value vegetable and fruit crops in northeast North Carolina. Including: hydroponics/Aquaponics, high tunnel and other season extension techniques, Organic certification for vegetable and fruit production.

January Events

January 4-5: Mapping with Drones (Virtual)

This 2-day virtual workshop will prepare participants with the knowledge necessary to take the FAA Remote Knowledge Aircraft Test (aka Part 107). All workshop materials are provided to participants (via snail-mail) prior to the workshop. The workshop has been well received by educators (high school, 2-year, 4-year), state & federal agency employees, the private sector (ranging from engineers to realtors), Cooperative Extension, and a slew of folks from various NGO's. This workshop is a great place to start for individuals who are considering using drones to support business applications, or managers who want to make solid decisions regarding drone issues moving forward.

January 5, 10:00-2:00 pm: Central Virginia Grower Meeting (Dillwyn, VA)

Several Amish communities have recently relocated to Central Virginia in the past several years and are in the beginning years of operating a produce auction. This grower meeting will include Christina Banks (VDACS), Darrel Clay (Timac Agro USA), and VCE Specialists, who will discuss the critical issues of marketing, soil fertility, major diseases and insect concerns regarding vegetables produced and sold at the auction. Dress warmly; the meeting will be in the produce auction, and expect an excellent Amish presence. Please register for this meeting, as lunch will be served.

January 8, 12:00-2:00 pm: Hemp Dos and Don'ts (Petersburg, VA)

This course will review some of hemp's basic dos and don'ts. The workshop is excellent for folks interested in hemp but unfamiliar with what they should and should not do to be successful. The discussion will include the different types of industrial hemp, growing conditions, genetics, and post-harvest processing. A representative from VDACS Industrial Hemp will be on site to cover the dos and don'ts from a legal perspective.

January 9, 10:00-12:00 pm: Drought Designation Opportunities (Lovingston, VA)

As of November 7, seventeen counties in Virginia have received USDA Drought Disaster Designation. This number will probably grow and does not include contiguous counties. The footprint of this disaster in Virginia is significant, and there are opportunities for agriculture producers that have been impacted. Learn about and take advantage of federal government programs that assist farmers and the implications of this disaster designation.

January 10, 6:00-8:00 pm: Grant Writing for Small-scale Farmers (Virtual)

Build confidence in applying for grants by joining farmer Anita Roberson of Botanical Bites & Provisional, LLC, as she shares basic grant writing information. Anita will speak about what is needed to assist farmers in receiving multiple grant awards. She will share information on planning, developing budgets and understanding grant scoring criteria. She will also share some unique tips and talk about her experience as a grant reviewer.

January 16, 9:00-11:00 am: Small Farm Orientation (Virtual)

This two-hour Zoom course is for new farmers with zero to five years of experience operating a farm. Ben Dukes, regional program assistant for the VSU Small Farm Outreach Program, will walk attendees through the process of how to develop a productive and profitable farm. Participants will receive a Small Farm Orientation manual.

January 17, 9:00-12:00 pm: Precision Agriculture in Virginia (Petersburg, VA)

Farmers and Growers will have the opportunity to learn about the different aspects of managing their farm field by field and intra-field by using multiple inputs that occur during the growing season up through post-harvest, along with the aids to farmers that make the decisions easier to make, such as precise soil testing locations to determine intra-field variables, disease or pest test results, or pre-side-dress nitrate testing, which will reduce variability in yields and increase farm profits.

January 17, 10:00-12:00 pm: What is Heirs Property (Petersburg, VA)

What is Heirs Property 101? Estate planning, land transition, land access and land succession. VSU-SFOP is holding this workshop to provide land inheritance education and resources to disadvantaged landowners and their heirs. Special guest presenter Lillian "Ebonie" Alexander, the Executive Director of the Black Family Land Trust, Inc., lives on her family farm in rural Southside Virginia. She will discuss the challenges families face in retaining land and family communication surrounding land inheritance. She will also share resources and steps for successful family land assets building and succession.

January 17-18: Virtual Shepard's Symposium (Virtual)

January 18, 10:30-12:00 pm: Home Cannery Tour (Farmville, VA)

Prince Edward Cannery has been in operation for home canning since 1975. Home and commercial users come to preserve their fruits, vegetables, and meats in this great facility. Participants will have a guided tour of the facility and equipment and see a product developed from beginning to end. The production manager for Virginia Food Works will be on hand to personally demonstrate the process "from farm to table" for the food preservation process. Food samples will be available for tasting and taking home.

January 18, 6:00-9:00 pm: Farm Equipment Safety & Maintenance Basics (Glade Spring, VA)

Whether you are an expert in farm equipment or not, it is important to note that machinery is one of the top causes of fatal agriculture-related injuries! Most accidents occur due to distracted, overtired, or unprepared operators. Farm equipment safety starts with you! The main goal of this workshop is to emphasize the importance of the basic safety precautions to take while operating farm equipment.

January 30, 1:00-3:00 pm: How to Plan and Purchase a Greenhouse or High Tunnel (Petersburg, VA)

A representative of RIMOL Greenhouse Systems will conduct a workshop on the various types of greenhouses and high tunnels available for use. He will explain methods for calculating the size needed for a particular farm or home operation. The presentation will also help determine the options available to customize greenhouses for your needs. A USDA representative will be available to present various funding methods through USDA program loans and grants.

January 31, 10:00-12:00 pm: Understanding Your Soils Using Web Soil Survey (Southill, VA)

Tammy Holler, nutrient management specialist for SFOP, will teach participants about the benefits of using the USDA online program, Web Soil Survey. WSS provides soil data and information produced by the National Cooperative Soil Survey. The soil survey is a detailed report on the soils of more than 95 percent of the nation's counties. It has maps with soil boundaries, photos, descriptions, and tables of soil properties and features. This will be a hands-on computer workshop. Using the Web Soil Survey program, we will look at each farmer's farm soil data.

February Events

February 6, 9:00-11:00 am: Mushroom Cultivation (Norfolk, VA)

Mushrooms are a small yet mighty culinary ingredient with many health benefits, from cancer prevention to brain health. Jason Hess, of Tidewater Mushroom Company LLC, will introduce participants to common gourmet mushroom varieties and their uses. Learn about the mushroom life cycle, nutrition facts, superfood statistics, and day-to-day operation of this unique urban indoor mushroom farm. Each participant will receive a grow bag, which they will inoculate following a tour with Q&A and an explanation of the lab, equipment, and growing mediums.

February 10: Woods and Wildlife Conference (Wytheville, VA)

These long-running full-day conferences provide information, tools, and personal contacts to help private woodland owners keep their woods, and the wildlife that live in them, healthy and productive. A variety of topics are offered to appeal to owners of both small and large tracts, and both new and experienced owners.

February 12, 12:00-2:00 pm: Basics of Biochar (Petersburg, VA)

This workshop will be an introduction to biochar and its many benefits. Biochar consists of tiny bits of hardwood charcoal steeped in a high biological and microbial mixture. We will briefly explain how it has been used in poor soils to help rejuvenate microbial life and nutrient capacity. We will also talk about preparing and utilizing biochar to amend poor soil.

February 14, 9:00-12:00 pm: Environmental Management of Nutrients (Petersburg, VA)

Learn about how to maximize your crop yields while being environmentally friendly. Find out why we manage phosphorus and nitrogen differently. Discover the best times to apply nutrients for healthy

plant growth. Find out about how you can do your part to protect your rivers and streams. This presentation will benefit students, farmers, gardeners, and other growers.

February 15, 10:00-12:00 pm: Eat Well – Live Well (Chase City, VA)

Jane Henderson, senior extension agent for family & consumer science in Amelia County, will provide research-based information on how incorporating fruits and vegetables into the diet leads to optimum health results. In this workshop you will enjoy food tastings and learn how to prepare delicious and healthy snacks and meals that will have you craving the good life!

February 20, 9:00-3:00 pm: Filing Farm Taxes (Southill, VA)

Even if you hire an accountant to assist with filing your farm taxes, there is important information that you need to know as a farmer. Farming is a business; good recordkeeping is essential for a successful farming operation. Using the tools you have, you can keep thorough records. These records will provide valuable information on which methods work best on your farm. They can help plan a realistic forecast for the coming year and may also be a requirement for lending institutions. Greg Carter will lead this workshop. He grew up on a small farm but worked in the corporate world. After retirement, Greg returned to his roots and started a small diversified farming operation, using the lessons he learned in business. Now, he shares this knowledge with other farmers.

March 6-7: Produce Safety Alliance Grower Training Course (Virtual)

The Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule is the first federally regulated standard for growing, harvesting, packing, and holding fresh produce in an effort to reduce microbial contamination and foodborne illness outbreaks. If you grow fruits or vegetables, attend a training for information about best practices, risk management, and regulatory requirements. The PSA Grower Training Course is one way to satisfy the FSMA Produce Safety Rule requirement.

March 7, 6:30-8:30 pm: Generation NEXT Legacy Planning Workshops (Virtual)

Learn how to pass your land and your legacy on to the next generation while keeping it intact, in forest, and in family ownership.

March 22-23: Beyond the Basics Advanced Landowner Retreat (Appomattox, VA)

Landowner Retreats are co-hosted by the Virginia Department of Forestry and Virginia Cooperative Extension. Retreats provide information on hardwood and pine forest management, legacy planning, management planning, and more. They combine classroom, field trip, and hands-on activities to teach concepts of sustainable woodland and wildlife management.
