An American Farmland Trust grant program providing direct support to farmers and ranchers

Grants will be awarded in amounts up to \$10,000 per project. A project may involve one or more individual farmers or farm families. Only one grant can be awarded per farmer/farm family. Funding for this program is limited. As funding remains, awards will be made on an ongoing basis to eligible applicants that fulfill all application requirements and meet selection criteria. Land tenure (ownership, a lease, license, or other written agreement) for a reasonable time period will be required for projects that involve on-the-ground improvements to farmland. If tenure is less than five years, please be prepared to demonstrate in the application that the tenure is sufficient in relation to the improvements being made or services being provided.

Episode 23 – 14: Grazing with Intent with Carl Stafford of VCE Culpeper County

What does the health of plants and animals have to tell us about life underground? In this episode, Jeff Ishee, Eric Bendfeldt, and Mary Sketch Bryant talk with Carl Stafford of Virginia Cooperative Extension in Culpeper County about the importance of grazing with intent for the benefit of plants, animals, and the soil. Carl is the Agricultural and Natural Resources Extension Agent in Stafford County and has an expertise in livestock forages, beef cattle management, and is an active leader in the Graze 300 program. In this episode, Carl discusses the importance of paying attention to the biological components of soil and the role that well managed livestock and grass management systems can play in supporting life underground. He shares who his mentors have been over the years and the importance of peer-to-peer networks for promoting innovation.

Episode 23 – 13: A Soil Your Undies Challenge with Elizabeth Baldwin and Meagan Dyer of VCE Page County

How can you really know your soil is alive, biologically active, and not sterile? Well, the answer is brief. Yes, really! Soil your undies, that is, bury a pair of your 100% cotton undies in an area of your garden or cropland where you are curious about its biological activity and wait about 60 days to see what happens and if the undies decompose through time due to the microbial life in the soil.

July 18, 10:30 – 2: 00 pm: Soil Health Show & Tell On Farm Visit at Bramble Hollow Farm

July Events

July 8, 9:00-11:00 am: Blueberry Pruning (Virginia Beach, VA)

Brad Baker has cleared about 1 acre of 30–40 foot trees that had been overgrown to cover blueberry bushes planted in the mid-1990s. He will demonstrate his pruning methods, which help to produce fruit for a U-Pick operation. The farm does not have installed irrigation and survives solely on what the weather brings. Bring your own pruners for supervised assistance.

July 10, 10:00-12:00 pm: High Tunnel Production for Season Extension (Petersburg, VA)

High tunnels are basically unheated greenhouses that are used to extend the growing season. This workshop will cover the basics of high tunnel production for new and beginning growers. It will cover crops that are traditionally grown as well as ideas for some specialty crops. The workshop will cover high tunnel structures and grower tips for year round growth in the high tunnel.

July 10, 3:00-5:00 pm: Growing Strawberries (Petersburg, VA)

This workshop will cover the basics of strawberry production for producers who are interested in growing strawberries on their farm. The workshop will cover the steps that growers should take to prepare their soil, source plugs and transplants, understand planting dates and growing methods. Suppliers are currently accepting preorders for plugs so growers need to know what supplies they will need for a successful crop planting.

July 10, 5:00 – 8:00 pm: Sow it, Grow it, Can it Class (Rocky Mount, VA)

During this 3-hr workshop, participants will learn tips and techniques for sowing and growing quality fresh products from their own garden that can be preserved at home by canning. Participants will also learn how to breakdown and can bulk purchases of meats like chicken, beef, or pork. During the canning lab, participants will learn about both water bath and pressure canning techniques. In this hands-on workshop, you will learn from VCE agriculture agents and a farm Bureau Women's Committee member who knows the art of canning. Cost is \$35 per participant and everyone will go home with items. <u>Please register to attend.</u>

July 11, 9:00 am – 4:00 pm: Southside Sustainable Ag Tour (Halifax, VA)

Join us for a one-day tour of Southside area farms to see four operations with various planting, growing and harvesting techniques, as well as successful marketing strategies. Tiver Farm. Bill Tiver produces 11 acres of mixed vegetables, including seven acres of sweet corn. He will share methods for operating without hired labor, using planting, recordkeeping and other strategies for efficiency. Clark Farm. Container crops are featured. Jimmy Clark grows nearly 20 different crops in more than 150 containers. Chandler Farm. Mark Chandler will show the farm's greenhouse and high tunnel, the pond, and a commercial aquaculture operation. Thaxton Farm. High tunnels and livestock production are featured at the Thaxton Farm where owners Robert and John Thaxton each have individual businesses of vegetables, eggs, chickens, pigs and goats. Robert has been able to produce fresh vegetables throughout the winter months in his high tunnel over the past five years.

July 11, 3:30-6:30 pm: Flower Production Field Day (Rohrersville, MD)

Join Future Harvest at Winding Root Farm for an in-depth field day on the inner mechanics of running a flower farm operation from production methods to diversifying sales modes.

July 14, 6:30 – 8:30 pm: Farm Safety Dinner (Rocky Mount, VA)

Calling all farmers! Join VCE for a free farm safety dinner. You will enjoy a delicious free meal while listening to farm safety topics that will be addressing common issues that dd to the daily stress in our lives. Talking about mental health can be difficult, but it si a very important topic for the agriculture community.

July 17, 1:00-4:00 pm: Free Union Flower Farm Day (Free Union, VA)

Owners Molly Schwoebel and Joel Slezak will welcome you to their farm, and demonstrate seeding, planting and transplanting techniques. You will hear about annual and perennial gardening and how they plan, plant, harvest, and make bouquets for farmers markets and other local sales. You'll see the seedling operation, the hoop house, and irrigation techniques. The farm is co-located with the Free Union Grass Farm, and part of the tour will show the poultry operation. Best of all, you'll hear how all this gets done with a toddler in tow. The tour will feature a farm honey tasting.

July 17, 5:00 – 7:30 pm: Cheese Making with New Dawn Acres Farm (Rocky Mount, VA)

During this 2.5 hour class, participants will learn the art of making ricotta stuffed mozzarella from fresh milk. You will learn about proper milk handling procedures when working with fresh milk while turing it into a delicious product. Dr. James Wilson, VA Tech Collegiate Assistant Professor, and Keith Tignor, VDACS State Apiarist, will present information on the life cycle and control of the Varroa mite. Find out how this pest is impacting honey bee populations and what beekeepers can do to minimize colony losses resulting from Varroa mite infestations. Presentations will include discussion of integrated pest management strategies to control this mite. Both presenters will be available in the Randolph Farm apiary during the afternoon to demonstrate how to inspect a hive to identify, sample for and control this pest of the honey bee. All individuals going to the bee yard must bring their own bee suit and wear light-colored clothes, gloves and closed-toe shoes. Please do not wear fragrances or perfumes. If you are allergic to bee venom, you must bring your own Epipen.

July 18, 6:00 – 8:00 pm: From My Head To-Ma-Toes (Warrenton, VA)

At the Fauquier Education Farm we have grown a wide variety of tomatoes in a multitude of methods.

Come join us in this workshop all about tomatoes to see what works, and what doesn't. Registration required.

July 18, 10:00 – 1:00 pm: Filing Farm Taxes (Rapidan, VA)

She will identify crops that are both beneficial to rabbits and easy to grow. Tammy will also talk about the best breeds of rabbits to purchase for rotational grazing.

July 26, 1:00 – 4:00 pm: Estate Planning and Land Transition (Virtual)

Lillian "Ebonie" Alexander, the Executive Director of the Black Family Land Trust, Inc., lives on her family farm in rural Southside Virginia. According to the US Department of Agriculture National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), family-owned farms account for 97 percent of the 2.1 million farms in the US, yet only 30 percent of these farms survive into the second generation, and only 12 percent are still operating by the third. Farmland preservation has become especially important with higher prices due to the flood of residential and commercial development. Ebonie will talk about the importance of farm estate planning and show you that it's not complicated. She will demonstrate why you need to take action and make a plan.

July 26, 1:00 – 3:00 pm: Dug In Farm Tour (White Stone, VA)

Dug In Farms is a small market farm located just miles from the Chesapeake Bay. As a thriving 12-month production farm utilizing many of Virginia's nutrient management practices, Dug In Farms has quickly adopted a variety of sustainable and organic methods to reduce non-point pollution in the Bay. Join us for a delightful afternoon farm tour with Carolyn Quinn as she shares her challenges and successes while growing her farm business, utilizing the available resources provided to farmers through DCR, FSA and NRCS.

<u>July 27, 6:30 – 8:30 pm: Small Ruminants: Flock/Herd Selection Considerations for Breeding Season</u> (Glade Spring, VA)

Breeding season and reproductive management of flocks and herds vary from farm to farm and are dependent on many factors. Regardless of management practices, most sheep and goat producers attempt to increase their flock's or herd's profitability and optimize the number of healthy offspring. What choices you make now—including whether to cull—will influence the next 8 to 10 months of the year in your flock or herd. Join other small ruminant producers to learn best management practices that are recommended regardless of the size of your operation.

July 27, 5:00 pm: 2023 Southern Piedmont AREC Field Day (Blackstone, VA)

This field tour will include concurrent tours of field crops and forage/livestock research field trials follow dinner. Virginia Tech's Center for Advanced Innovation in Agriculture (CAIA) will be introduced. Please register to attend.

July 27-29: Beef Up: Efficient, Progressive, Profitable, Beef (Blacksburg, VA)

The School of Animal Sciences, in collaboration with VT Meat Center, Virginia Cooperative Extension, and Virginia Beef Industry Council will be hosting Beef-Up on July 27-29 on campus. Beef-Up is a 3-day handson beef processing course aimed at improving the efficiencies and capacities of beef processing workforce and facilities within the Commonwealth. Through hands-on learning of both beef harvesting and fabrication, participants will be able to learn progressive processes and techniques to help improve their skill-sets and production goals. Furthermore, participants will engage in informative learning sessions covering an array of topics aimed at increasing current understanding of food safety and regulatory compliance, as well as methods for producing high quality beef that meets the modern consumers demands. Individuals who are seeking to expand their knowledge of beef processing, as well as individuals who are currently working within the beef processing industry, or those who are looking to enter it - are highly encouraged to attend Spaces are limited and application process is required.

August Events

August 3, 9:00 – 3:00 pm: Tri State Beef Conference (Blountville, TN)

The fifteenth Annual Tri-State Beef Cattle conference will be held at the Ron Ramsey Regional Ag Center in Blountville, Tennessee on August 3rd. This year's conference will address topics of interest to both stocker and cow-calf producers. The conference will be a one-day event and will include educational sessions covering such topics as approaching your lender, pasture management, beef cattle outlook, predator control, and antibiotic rules and colostrum quality. There will once again be virtual tours of operations from each of the three states and then a time of questions and answers with the producers themselves.

August 4, 9:00-11:00 am: Agroforestry Farm Tour with Q&A (Virginia Beach, VA)

Chris and Kelly Shepherd, owners of What The Farm, incorporate farming and grazing practices that rebuild the soil organically while restoring degraded soil biodiversity in hopes to improve soil health. What The Farm is on a 33 acre plot with approximately 10 wooded acres used for agroforestry. They specialize in Dexter cattle, Dorper and St. Croix hair sheep, Duroc pigs, Cornish Cross chickens, and white turkeys. The Shepherds believe there is a better way compared to commercial farming operations and have focused on a simple mission of: serve the SOIL, serve the ANIMALS, serve the COMMUNITY.

August 8, 5:30 – 7:00 pm: Tree Fruit Basics: Apples (Roseland, VA)

This tree fruit basics class will cover everything you need to know about growing your own apples. Topics include site selection, cultivar selection, pruning, pest and disease management, and harvest. Whether you already have a tree or you're thinking about planting apples, this is the class for you! Taught by Dickie Brothers Orchard's very own John Bruguiere and your local tree fruit Extension Agent, Grace Monger. This educational workshop-style series is organized by Nelson County VCE and hosted by local tree fruit producers. Dress appropriately for the weather as we will be outdoors and an educational walking tour is part of our program.

August 9, 10:00 – 12:00 pm: Dexter 101 (Keysville, VA)

This workshop will introduce participants to Dexter cattle and provide guidance and decision-making tools for small beef producers who are considering herds that include Dexter genetics. The information presented is based on current research being conducted at Virginia State University to access the appropriateness of Dexter and Dexter x Mashona crosses for small beef producers in Virginia. Dexter cattle are a small frame dual-purpose breed with the potential for meat to be more marbled than that of commercial breeds. Mashona cattle are hardy and known for their resistance to high temperatures, ticks and flies; and their ability to maintain reproductive efficiency in semi-arid regions.

August 9, 10:00 -12:00 pm: Recordkeeping on your Computer or Smart Phone (Virtual)

Farming is a business, and good recordkeeping is essential for a successful farming operation. Using the tools you have, you can keep thorough records. These records will provide valuable information on which methods work best on your farm. They can help plan a realistic forecast for the coming year and may also be a requirement for lending institutions. Greg Carter will lead this workshop. He grew up on a small farm but worked in the corporate world. After retirement, Greg returned to his roots and started a small

diversified farming operation, using the lessons he learned in business. Now he shares this knowledge with other farmers.

The Spotted Lanternfly is an invasive species native to Asia. In 2014 it was found in Pennsylvania, and has since spread to multiple counties in Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Virginia. This insect is a threat to many fruit crops and trees. The Asian Longhorn Tick is native to eastern Asia. It is a serious pest of livestock as well as pets. Cattle producers and homeowners should be aware of it. This important information will be presented by Scott Baker, ANR Agent in Bedford County.

August 17, 9:00-3:00 pm: SNAP Program for Small Farmers (Petersburg, VA)

Learn how SNAP EBT and Virginia Fresh Match empower families with tight food budgets to bring home more fresh fruits and vegetables by increasing their purchasing power. Beginning, socially disadvantaged, and veteran farmers can get help to prepare applications for farm ownership and operating loans and learn about the requirements for borrowing. Find out about the resources and current grants that are available from USDA, including the Rural Development Renewable Energy for America (REAP) grant and loan guarantee program, Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) program, and Rural Business Enterprise Grant (RBEG) program. USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) programs are also available. These programs can help you implement conservation practices to reduce soil erosion, enhance water supplies, improve water quality, increase wildlife habitat and reduce damages caused by floods and other natural disasters.

August 24, 5:30 – 8:30 pm: High Tunnel Vegetable Production (Wytheville, VA)

High tunnel vegetable production is a game changer in the commercial vegetable world, allowing for year-round growing conditions. Grace Summers, SFOP State Program Assistant, will share her many years

of experience and extension expertise in high tunnel commercial vegetable production. She will cover the topics of management, irrigation, crop selection, planting dates, and production practices.

August 29, 10:00 – 12:00 pm: Dexter 101 (Rapidan, VA)

This workshop will introduce participants to Dexter cattle and provide guidance and decision-making tools for small beef producers who are considering herds that include Dexter genetics. The information presented is based on current research being conducted at Virginia State University to access the appropriateness of Dexter and Dexter x Mashona crosses for small beef producers in Virginia. Dexter cattle are a small frame dual-purpose breed with the potential for meat to be more marbled than that of commercial breeds. Mashona cattle are hardy and known for their resistance to high temperatures, ticks and flies; and their ability to maintain reproductive efficiency in semi-arid regions.

August 31, 7:00-8:00 pm: Extending the Sheep & Goat Grazing Season Virtual Pasture Walk (Virtual)

An important goal for most livestock producers is to extend the grazing season, filling gaps in the availability of pasture forage. During this virtual pasture walk, we will look at ways to improve your pastures, increase carrying capacity and lengthen your grazing season. Learn how to improve pasture quality, increase production, and lower grazing expenses for sheep and goats.

September Events

September 7, 9 am – 12:00 pm: Sustainable Forestry & Small Wood Lot Management (Halifax, VA)

Sustainable forestry management is complex, with the need to manage trees, wildlife and the environment. We will discuss topics such as determining your management goals; working with forest professionals; timber sales and harvest; water quality; forest health; wildlife and other unexpected factors. We will also provide information on USDA programs and services relating to forestry management, tree planting and financial assistance. At the end of the workshop we will visit two forestry sites.
