Farm and Food System Fellowship-Applications due March 10

Allegheny Mountain Institute's 18-month Farm and Food System Fellowship is a tuition-free, educational program that fully sponsors, trains, and empowers individuals to become teachers and advocates for a food system that is socially, environmentally, and economically just. Selected Fellows spend six months in experiential, residential Farm and Food Study at AMI's Allegheny Farm Campus, followed by a Community Action Year, applying their training in partnership with regional non-profit organizations.

<u>Request for Proposals: Small Minority and Veteran Farmers of the Piedmont expands farm to fork and</u> <u>food to table initiatives</u>

The Minority and Veteran Farmers of the Piedmont will contract with up to seven minority, veteran, and socially disadvantaged farmers to grow and supply fruit, vegetables, herbs, meat, and other commodities to local food banks. In essence, MVFP will "purchase" produce from these farms, and ask that instead of delivering the food to us, that the farms directly supply the Rappahannock, Madison, Orange, Fauquier, and Greene Food Banks. Payments will be made in two installments following commodity drop-offs. The farmer will be awarded a grant of up to \$3,000 for their contributions throughout the growing season.

March 4-5 Virginia Virtual Berry School

The two-day school will provide experienced and beginning Virginia berry growers with the latest research and information about starting a berry enterprise and production management of berry crops, including blueberries and blackberries.

March 9 and 10: 2021 Farm Management Institute

This year's content and lecture will be relevant to those who are lifelong learners, including young farmers, potential young farmers, parents, 4-H and FFA students and those continuing or expanding their farming operations. Registered participants will hear from two renowned speakers.

March 11: Farmer-to-Farmer Chat: Non-Profit Farming

Join your fellow non-profit farmers (and managers) from 11:00-1:00 pm EST for a collective discussion hosted by Future Harvest about the unique challenges and benefits to farming as a 501c3. March 12: Building Soil Health to Sustain Virginia's Farms and Protect Water Quality: An Organic Approach with Mark Schonbeck

Six Principles of Soil Health Management, and strategies and methods through which organic producers put these principles into practice will be discussed. Mark will explore how healthy agricultural soils can protect Virginia's natural resources including the Chesapeake Bay, sustain farm resilience and economic viability, and help address the climate crisis. The webinar will include examples of how working organic farms successfully apply these principles on some of Virginia's predominant soil types.

March 11: Quickbooks Online Training

This workshop presented by Michell Green, SFOP Financial Analyst, will help farmers and ranchers learn to manage accounting and recordkeeping for their businesses. The topics covered include setting up financial records, preparing a chart of accounts, entering payments, deposits and invoices, tracking customers and creating estimates, reconciling bank statements, analyzing financial data and printing reports. Training does not include QuickBooks software or licenses.

March 11: Farmers Market Preparedness Part IV "How to Tell Your Story"

Virginia Cooperative Extension Small Farm Outreach Program at Virginia State University in conjunction with the Virginia Farmers Market Association will share how to craft and tell your farm story. You will learn about marketing/branding/social media. In addition, you will hear about different ways to market your business and what works and more importantly what hasn't worked in this new market reality.
