<u>S5 - E11: Common Ties: Cooperation and Sustainability with Elizabeth McMullen and Garland</u> <u>Mason of Organic Valley (Pt. I)</u>

Public Relations Specialist Elizabeth McMullen and Sustainability Funding and Communications Specialist Garland Mason of Organic Valley Cooperative join Mary and Eric to discuss the power of cooperation in preserving small and mid-size family farms. In this episode, they share the history of Organic Valley, which began as a vegetable cooperative in 1988 and now supports over 1,500 dairy farmer-members across 29 states. Discover how sustainable practices, such as composting, solar energy, nutrient management, and the use of Agolin Naturu (a natural feed supplement), are helping farmers reduce emissions and remain profitable.

S5 - E10: Farmers Talking with Farmers with Anthony Beery of Beery Farms, Part II

Farmer-to-farmer connections are crucial for enhancing soil health, promoting innovation, and fostering mentorship. June 12, 6:00 - 8:00 PM: Farm and Farm Equipment Safety (Highway Rapidan, VA)

Each year, more than 300 commercial tractor-related deaths occur. Almost half of these are caused by overturns. Many are caused by PTOs not being properly shielded or shut down. Other causes include vehicle collisions, hitting overhead objects such as tree limbs, being crushed during repairs, or being burned during refueling. This workshop will review various practices to help you stay safe on the farm, including how to be knowledgeable about tractors and use them safely and adequately, conduct pre-operational safety checks, and take special precautions necessary for operating equipment on rough terrain and slopes. Use of personal protective equipment will also be reviewed. They will also provide additional resources to help you learn more about farm safety and answer questions about avoiding risk on your farm.

June 13, 12:00 - 2:00 PM: Introduction to JADAM Farming (Petersburg, VA)

Organic farming can be expensive. The fertilizers and pesticides required to improve crop health for bountiful harvests can add up quickly. What if there were a way to create your products from the waste and excess that you have around your farm or property? This workshop will introduce you to JADAM farming techniques. These procedures utilize organic and natural inputs around your immediate area to create natural fertilizers and pesticides.

Garlic is one of the easiest and most rewarding crops you can grow—resilient, lowmaintenance, and virtually pest-free. In this hands-on workshop, you'll learn everything you need to know to grow a thriving garlic crop, including the often-overlooked first harvest: garlic scapes. We'll explore the importance of early planting to maximize root and leaf development before bulb formation begins. Come discover the secrets to growing flavorful, robust garlic from start to finish!

Saturday, June 14, 2025, from 10:00 am - 1:00 pm - Experience a Butterbee Farm tour, and Leslie Lewis, of Living Systems Soil, will teach us how to make compost that encourages active microbiology with abundant and diverse aerobic microorganisms. Biologically rich and alive compost can then be used as a soil amendment that promotes ecological health from the ground up, giving plants what they need from the soil. This compost-making system requires no machinery at all so that it can be a great fit for small-scale farmers with small budgets. FREE
