Why grow Christmas Trees?

Long term business venture
Not a get rich quick scheme!
Consider the pros and cons



Pros Cons

- Growing Christmas trees ties land up for less time than it does to produce other timber products
- Christmas trees can be grown on small acreages
- Less disturbance to groundcover
- Reduced machinery requirements

- Must have capital reserves to cover production costs for several years
- Same risks associated with growing other crops (weather, insects, diseases)

\$ Economics \$

- Revenue:
 - Economics on Christmas trees is a bit harder than with other commodities because we have less data.
 - Retail and Choose and Cut prices can range from \$53 \$>100, but a lot of this pricing also depends on your area.
 - Wholesale prices (Fraser) between \$35 and \$50.
- Expenses:
 - Early costs: seedlings and planting
 - Maintenance: \$1-\$1.50/tree per year.
 - **Estimated** cost per tree: Wholesale, \$22 Retail/C&C, \$30

WHOLESALE CHRISTMAS TREES

Selling large amounts of trees at one time

Wholesale

- Selling large amounts to one or a few
- buyers
 - Trees are pre-tagged in the field based on size and grade
 - Trees must retain quality during storage and shipment
- Less \$ per tree
 - Local and national competition
 - In VA, wholesale growers are mainly in SWVA
- Phytosanitary certificates/others for shipping



Let's visit a wholesale operation!

CHOOSE AND CUT CHRISTMAS TREES

Customers walk through the farm, select their tree, and may or may not cut the tree down themselves.



Choose and Cut

- Higher prices than a wholesale tree
- Can also sell other Christmas items
 - Wreaths, roping, etc.
- You will be managing fields with different species and ages
- Short sales season! (Thanksgiving Christmas)
- You are selling an *experience*, not just the tree!



Let's visit a choose and cut operation!

RETAIL Lots

Retail lots consist of a temporary setup to sell pre-cut trees.



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RETAIL LOTS

- With retail lots, may be limited by location, access, or competition
- Can demand a high price for trees
- You will lose any trees that aren't sold!



SOCIAL MEDIA/ONLINE MARKETING

Social media is people's go-to when finding information today. Be current – be visible – incorporate videos!



UP-TO-DATE WEBSITE

You need a website – not just a Facebook! A website belongs to **you** and can make you easier to find on Google!

Site Selection and Preparation

Selecting good sites gives you a critical head start with the gambles of farming!

- Suitable amount of land
 - Appropriate soil type
 - Elevation
 - Microclimates
- Water and Air Drainage
- Roads and access for harvesting

- 1. Early and proper planning is imperative!
- 2. Consult your local VCE agent, read the production guides listed at the end of this presentation, join your local Christmas tree growers association, and start attending relevant meetings and workshops.
- 3. Early mistakes in species selection, road layout, spacing, etc. can take years to overcome!

Site Preparation

- 1. May include:
 - Removing existing trees and/or stumps/other obstacles
 - Controlling grasses and weeds
- 2. You should prep your site the fall before planting.
- 3. Soil testing can be done with the help of your local Extension office.



Species should be largely determined by geographic region and climate. Also consider popularity and supply.

Select the right size, age, and quality planting stock.



White Pine

New exotic species

- Concolor fir

- Serbian spruce

*White pine, Scotch pine, Virginia pine, and Norway spruce are available through the Virginia Department of Forestry.



Start small! Build markets up gradually.

Plan for access for harvesting and accessibility of roads. (General rule – no place in plantation should be more than 100 ft from a road!)

Plant soon as possible in the spring to allow roots to develop.
